
The Pastor's Pen

How important is baptism?

Water baptism is a somewhat controversial subject. In fact, differences over baptism have led to the inception of new denominations. There have been questions about the subjects of baptism, the act itself, and the purpose of baptism. I want to address three areas in answering the question, how important is baptism?


The subjects of baptism. Before one is baptized, one must believe, repent, and confess Christ's deity (Mk. 16: 16, Acts 2: 38, Rom. 10: 9-10, Acts 8: 36-37). One must also have sin to be forgiven (Acts 2: 38). There is also the necessity for some understanding of sin, God, and his word (cf. Acts 8: 26-40). It is not surprising, therefore, to read: "And believers were the more added to the Lord, multitudes both of men and women" (Acts 5: 14, no babies). Though

we cheer when children are baptized, we must remember it is "believers' baptism." I for one as director of Christian education am saddened by the number of young people who get baptized and never grow in their faith. Years ago, the thought was if you were not baptized you could not participate in any church activity. This set the tone for a false understanding of baptism. The false notion of, if you were nearing 12 years of age you needed to get baptized. There is nowhere in the Bible that says baptism should be done before a certain age! Whatever age a person comes to Christ "believing" is the acceptable age! It is up to the church to teach children what baptism is all about. A child with no understanding of baptism will see the baptism event as nothing more than a "a cool dip in the

pool", and what kid would not pass up that opportunity?

The act of baptism. Is baptism sprinkling, pouring, or immersion? Baptism (the Greek noun baptisma) means, "consisting of the processes of immersion, submersion and emergence" (W.E. Vine, Expository Dictionary of New Testament Words). Baptism is a burial (Rom. 6: 4, Col. 2:12). Only immersion (burial) symbolizes the death, burial, and resurrection of the Lord (Rom. 6) We as members of St. John "Baptist" church believe in full immersion. Matthew 3:16 indicates Jesus after his baptism came "Straight up" out of the water! I might add also that baptism is the first step to obedience in following the Lord Jesus Christ!

The purpose of water baptism. Baptism, when preceded by faith, repentance, and con-



fession, is for or unto the remission of sin (Acts 2: 38, 22: 16). It is in the act of baptism that Jesus' blood is spiritually contacted (Matt. 26: 28, see "for the remission of sin," compare with Acts 2: 38). Baptism places one in Christ where salvation and all spiritual blessings are found (Gal. 3: 26-27, same as "added to the Lord," Acts 5: 14, Eph. 1: 3-6). Baptism is the official putting off the old man and putting on the new man (Rom. 6).

Have you been scripturally baptized? Many have been baptized not knowing the true meaning of baptism, we here at St John want to educate you on what it means to be baptized! If you have questions, please contact me (405) 478-3344. Be encouraged!

Evangelism Ministry Update!

LIVING THE "WIDOW'S MITES" AND THE "TWO FISHES AND FIVE LOAVES"

MARK 6:41, 43 "And when he had taken the five loaves and two fishes, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before them and the two fishes divided he among them all...And they took up twelve baskets full of fragments, and of the fishes."

LUKE 21:4/(WIDOW'S OFFERING "For all these have of their abundance cast in unto the offerings of God: but she of her penury has cast in all the living that she had".

In March and April of 2021, Dr. Major L. Jemison envisioned having a "clothing pantry". It was a vision and a spiritual nudging and many thought it should not happen at St. John. Reverend Cornelius D. Wade was offered the vision as another way to live out the Evangelism and Prison Ministries. There were not clothes and no place identified to house them. How the clothing pantry would materialize was anything but clear. Reverend Wade prayed about it and the Lord seemed to be silent and Reverend Wade was preparing to say "no way" too, because God seemed to be saying "no" in the silence.

OUT OF NOWHERE, A CALL CAME FROM A WIDOW (B.B.), offering Reverend Wade and St. John her husband's clothes. When Reverend Wade got her call and her offer, he laughed. She probably thought he was a little crazy. It was in fact the answer to the question of whether St. John should do a "clothing pantry". Reverend Wade accepted the clothes and stored them in his garage until he could get an answer on where they would be at the Church. Finally, it was decided the garage would be the home for the "clothing pantry" "HAND ME UP(S)".

NO MAN IS AN ISLAND and so, prayers went up to ask who should help with this new vision. THREE WOMEN CAME TO MIND DURING THIS PRAYER TIME, J.R., S.J.T., and F.G. There were others, but these three said yes to the vision. A call went out in April and the first "HAND ME UP(S)" give away was held in May. Like the 2 fishes and five loaves, the clothes seem to multiply. Revered W.M. made a call to Deacon L. in Texas and Deacon L. brought a station wagon full of


clothes to Oklahoma City. By June, we had enough clothing to old a major clothing give away at McGuire Plaza. The vision for McGuire Plaza came from R.V. In amazement, Reverend Wade and the team watched as the vision became a reality. By December, we had enough clothing to give 18 boxes of clothes to Jesus House and 2 boxes to "Dress For Success". Just when we thought we'd given everything away, we had another 2 boxes for "Dress For Success".

I (REVEREND C.D. WADE) DON'T KNOW WHAT HAPPENED WITH THE 2 FISHES AND FIVE LOAVES. I DO KNOW JESUS SAID A PRAYER and it (a boy's lunch) was more than enough. I do know that at St. John AN OBEDIENT WIDOW gave her gift and it cause a minister to be obedient to GOD'S CALL. We put out A CALL TO THE ST. JOHN MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH FAMILY, AND THE CHURCH FAMILY AN-

SWERED THE CALL. Everyone gave what they had, great and small, it has proven, more than enough, and may have come and left "filled". MAY WE ANSWER THE CALL IN 2022. The January 15, 2022 effort had extreme challenges with the frigid temperatures and numbers were low. WE REMAIN ON TARGET FOR 3RD SAT-URDAY, MARCH 19, 2022. ABOUT THE OKLAHOMA HOMEOWNER ASSISTANCE FUND

With the guidance of the U.S. Department of the Treasury, Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency launched the Oklahoma Homeowner Assistance Fund on January 10, 2022. Made available through the American Rescue Plan Act, the HAF program provides financial assistance to homeowners who have experienced a significant loss of income due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Homeowners may apply for up to a \$20,000 HAF grant



Eligible Uses of HAF Grants

Housing obligations as listed below and not incurred/ billed prior to January 21, 2020 are eligible uses of HAF program proceeds:

- Delinquent first and second mortgage principal and interest (P&I)
- Delinquent property taxes
- Escrow shortage Homeowner and condominium association fees Homeowner hazard, flood and mortgage insurance Reasonable lender-assessed fees
- Up to three additional P&I payment after mortgage
- Past due loan payments to government or nonprofit entities for down payment assistance

Technology Media/ Digital Ministry

Digital Ministry: More about culture than computers

We don't need to be power-users of every new digital technology. We don't need to be early adopters, nor do we need to devote considerable energy to the work of digital media. But as church leaders, we do need to be attuned to our broader digital culture.

All of us are part of a broad, tech-shaped culture that conditions us to think, learn, and act in ways that are rather different from the time before the rise of smartphones, high-speed internet and the pandemic. As church leaders tasked with setting mission and vision, our leadership always intersects with this surrounding tech-shaped culture. Our goal shouldn't be to adopt every new technology. Our goal should be to study digital culture to find areas of overlap with our mission and vision. Ministries aligned to digital culture need not be digitally sophisticated. They simply need to be aware of some core values that all of us share in common.

• The Core Values of Tech-Shaped Culture

With this goal in mind, here is what we mean when we talk about tech-shaped culture: Fundamentally, to understand tech-shaped culture is to understand how and when widespread digital technologies influence the meaning-making process. To know something of tech-shaped culture is to know that digital tools are changing meaning-making by facilitating the asking of questions, by forging new types of connection, by encouraging collaboration, and by making space for creativity.

• Cultural Value 1: Questions

Perhaps the most direct way that digital technology influences our culture is through questions. You can think of major technologies like Google, Siri, and even Netflix as tools that invite our questions and provide us with many possible answers. In the digital age, we expect opportunities to learn and grow through questions. This expectation extends into our spiritual life, where we expect to find God through reflection, introspection, and questioning. Whether online or offline, it is our responsibility to create a space for our communities to engage their questions and to sift through answers, even if those questions don't directly pertain to "churchy" topics.

• Cultural Value 2: Connection

Digital technology influences connection by turning everything into a hybrid experience, a blend of offline and online. Tools like Zoom, WhatsApp, and Facebook Live continue to blur the line between online and offline. As participants in tech-shaped
